CLOVER CELEBRATED SEVERAL MAJOR MILESTONES, INCLUDING:

- 125 years of innovative and life transforming service to our community.
- The 50th anniversary of **Clover Cares**, one of the first Adult Day Care Centers in Louisiana.
- Tenth anniversary of **Educare New Orleans**, the first Educare School in the Deep South and a model for highest quality early learning.
- The agency was honored to host the **20th Annual Educare Learning Network Meeting**, welcoming more than 200 leaders, parents, educators and researchers from across the Network's 25 schools nationwide, along with backbone supporters from Buffett Early Childhood Fund and Start Early.

A key moment during this time was the agency's decision to change our name, based upon newly discovered revelations about the racist and white supremacist beliefs of our namesake, Charles Kingsley. We engaged in a highly inclusive, thoughtful and strategic approach to this important renaming process and arrived at a name that we believe is highly reflective of the resiliency and tenacity of our families and community, as well as our historic mission and vision.

While we are now Clover, we are most certainly not walking away from 127 years of service to our community. We will continue to provide the innovative, high quality, high impact, life transforming programs and services that have come to define this organization, rooted in equity and an unyielding commitment to providing access and opportunity to ALL people.

We thank everyone who has supported us through this process of discovery and change and, most importantly, for continuing to support our mission to educate children, strengthen families and build community.

125th Anniversary Celebration



Our Services

Adult Day Care

Clover Cares provides year-round compassionate, hands-on and holistic care for medically fragile seniors, veterans and adults. With more than two dozen veterans in the program, Clover Cares is also the only Adult Day Care in the Greater New Orleans area that contracts directly with the VA for this vital service to area veterans in need.



Early Learning Services

Clover Academy is now the 2nd largest Head Start grantee in Louisiana and offers the most diverse early learning continuum in the state, positively impacting more than 2,000 infants, toddlers and pre-school aged children and their families daily, working closely with our 10 childcare partner providers in Orleans and Jefferson Parishes. Clover is also the operating partner of Educare New Orleans, a national model of highest quality early learning and the first early childhood development and education facility of its kind in the Deep South.

Workforce Development

Clover Career Connections helped hundreds of parents, caregivers and other community residents obtain valuable entry-level and advanced certifications, from which they transitioned into well-compensated, career-focused jobs in today's top industries.

Resident Engagement Services

Comprehensive community-based services for the residents of Columbia Parc at the Bayou District, Heritage Senior Residences and Sacred Heart at St. Bernard. Services include case management; career training; emergency rental; utilities and food assistance; resources to address health care and food insecurity; free civil legal aid services; and Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA).

Youth Services

Summer academic & enrichment program for New Orleans youth on Clover's Historic campus includes art, computer programming, STEAM exploration, financial literacy, and weekly field trips to fun and exciting locations throughout the area.

Advocacy

Clover constantly engages program participants, board leaders, staff and stakeholders in vital advocacy efforts on the local, state and national levels. Working in tandem with our many extraordinary public and private partner organizations, we help to ensure passage of numerous pieces of legislation that benefit those we serve and our entire community. One of the most significant and impactful outcomes of these advocacy efforts was the passage in 2022 of the unprecedented voter-approved New Orleans Early Childhood Millage, which will invest nearly a half billion dollars of municipal funding over the next 20 years in comprehensive early education and supports. This extraordinary influx of public support has enabled access to comprehensive, high quality early learning for more than 1,700 Orleans Parish infants and toddlers, ensuring that they will be fully prepared to succeed in school, and in life.





Legacy & Innovation

Eleanor McMain becomes head resident, shaping the organization into a model of excellence.

1901

First playground and structured recreational activities for children in the city, giving rise to NORD.

1904

First training for nurses' aides in the state, becoming one of only two such schools in the country.

1917

First home of the Tulane School of Social Work, the fifth-oldest school of social work in the country.

1927

1896

Established as the first settlement house in the South to help immigrants overcome barriers to success.

1903

First free health clinic for women and children in the city.

1911

First job training classes for sight impaired in the state, the catalyst for Louisiana's Lighthouse for the Blind.

1946

First recreation program in New Orleans for African-American and white children in the same location.





Swimming pool opens and becomes the first integrated public pool in New Orleans.

1957



Plays a pivotal role in helping the community recover and rebuild in the wake of Hurricane Katrina's devastation.

2005

Opening of the Patrick F. Taylor Campus, one of the first purpose built inter-generational facilities for seniors and young children in Louisiana.

2015

125th Anniversary commemorated. Leadership announces plans for Name Change.

1964

First traditionally white serving agency in New Orleans to racially integrate all programs.



1973

Launches one of the first Adult Day Care programs in the state.



2013

Partners to open the first Educare School in the Gulf South.
